Synopsis

MEANWHILE is a docu-poem in six verses about artists breathing through chaos. In dynamic collaboration, Jacqueline Woodson (text), Meshell Ndegeocello (soundscape), Erika Dilday (support), M. Trevino (structure), and Catherine Gund (direction), combine artists' expressions with historical and observational footage to unveil a rare cinematic mediation about identity, race, racism and resistance as they shape our shared breath.

Director's Statement

MEANWHILE is not just a film; it's a journey, a conversation, an experience not an education, reflecting the chaos of existence and the beauty found within it. Since its inception in 2020, this cinematic poem has been a communal effort to explore the complexities of truth and identity. Cinema—like identity—is entirely constructed, merely and astonishingly, a practice. Natalie Diaz's poignant words served as our guiding light: "I don't know that the natural condition of life is a state of relief." In other words, our human condition is one of constant flux and uncertainty rather than a fixed truth.

A poem in six verses, MEANWHILE features multi-disciplinary artists breathing through the chaos. We watch these vanguards navigate the complexities of race, racism, and creative resistance not only in the moments of violence but in the ubiquity and legacy of that risk. Rather than focusing on finished products, we delve into process. Dance sequences are in rehearsal, drawings are halfway done, music is still in its composition phase, photographers take test shots, and in each sequence, we see the film being made. Our project lives as a constellation, willfully incomplete. We're not saying, look at this solution or resolution. Instead, we invite you to be with us, in the meanwhile.

Breath, a universal symbol of life and resilience, is MEANWHILE's throughline, symbolizing our shared humanity in the midst of daily crises. Inspired by the disorientation of the pandemic and the uprising in response to the suffocation of George Floyd, MEANWHILE captures the essence of 2020 as a historical moment, weaving together personal narratives, and artistic visions. My friend, the poet and journalist, Ivy Young, uses an oxygen tank throughout her days and nights. She advises us to "breathe through the panic and get to the next step so that you're okay in this moment."

We eschew images of trauma, committed to not re-traumatize nor to indulge violence or spectacles of pain. Society insistently traumatizes us to keep us controlled, fixed in space, unable to change, and exploits fear to maintain that system. Experimental filmmaker Barbara Hammer once said, "There's a difference between filming the process of oppression versus the process of liberation." Centering the voices of artists allowed us to document the process of liberation while

remembering what got us here and what will take us to a free tomorrow. Together, we reclaim our agency and imagine new possibilities for the future.

In the tradition of docu-essay films being offered as letters, MEANWHILE is a love letter to ourselves, a reminder of our collective strength and flexibility. The author, narrator Jacqueline Woodson says, "This is not a love letter to this country, but to us, inside this country. We see us. We love us. We make eye contact and nod to us." This film is a guide to nourish our intuitions while we're alive, here, now. As viewers immerse themselves in the world of MEANWHILE, they are invited to contemplate identity, liberation, and the power of collective action. At a rough cut screening, a college student shared through tears, "I didn't want the film to end because I don't want to be alone again."

Ultimately, I hope MEANWHILE sparks a new lexicon, a new way of seeing, one that transforms binaries and fixed identities. By understanding identity as an experience and embracing the chaos of existence, we open ourselves up to new possibilities and forge connections that transcend the limitations of our current reality.

Founder and Director of Aubin Pictures, Catherine Gund is an Emmy-nominated and Academy-shortlisted producer, director, writer, and activist. Her media work focuses on strategic and sustainable social transformation, arts and culture, HIV/AIDS and racial, reproductive and environmental justice. Her films have screened around the world in festivals, theaters, museums, and schools; on PBS, HBO, Paramount+, the Discovery Channel, Sundance Channel, Free Speech TV, Netflix, and Amazon Prime. She won the 2023 Gracie Award for Documentary Producer. Her films include: *Paint Me a Road Out of Here, Meanwhile, Angola Do You Hear Us? Voices From a Plantation Prison, Primera, Aggie, Chavela*, and *Born to Fly.* She has served on several arts, media, and justice nonprofit boards and has been a creative advisor on numerous documentary films. Jacqueline Woodson is a novelist, poet and screenwriter. She is the author of more than thirty books. Her accolades include the National Book Award, a MacArthur Fellowship, Coretta Scott King Awards, and NAACP Awards among many others.

M. Trevino is an award-winning queer Latinx filmmaker, audio artist, activist and educator based in New York City. He has been making films and audio productions since 1999, and has collaborated with organizations like the Tribeca Film Institute, Downtown Community Television (DCTV), The Kitchen, Maysles Documentary Center and City University of New York. His works center on issues pertaining to gender, ethnography, ritual, and memory, and has been presented in major cities in the United States including New York, San Francisco, Houston and Detroit. Meshell Ndegeocello, Composer

Meshell Ndegeocello is a German-born American singer-songwriter, rapper, and bassist. Her Grammy award-winning music incorporates a wide variety of influences,

As a prolific multi-instrumentalist and poetic intellectual, Ndegeocello's music weaves together sensual sentiments, spinning storytelling and activism into its own (sub)genre of soul. Most recently, Meshell crafted the theme song for Netflix's "We The People."
